04/15/1969 – Three charter members – Mrs. Freda Blose, Mrs. Verna Cook and Miss Hazel Gibson – were on hand for 41st birthday celebration of Kittanning Business Professional Woman's Club last night at the Elk's Home.

04/15/1969 – The paint-smearred cannon in front of Ford City High School is being repainted by three members of the school's student council. Hal Altman, John Brindger, and Tim Miller are covering the red and white smears which appeared on the cannon just prior to the Kittanning-Ford City grid contest. While members of student council, the three students are also Ford City football players.

04/15/1969 – Science Fair top three winners of West Kittanning Elementary School are Mary Lou Capone with her chart on Magnetism, first place; Bob Pryde, with his chart on paper, third prize; Tom Southworth, a demonstration of steam power, second prize. The students are in the fifth grade. Prizes were awarded by West Kittanning-Applewold Parent Teachers Association. Five others received honorable mention, and four more received special recognition.

04/15/1964 – Compensation for extracurricular activities by teachers and a professional pay schedule for the 1964-65 fiscal year, starting in July, was authorized last night by the operating committee of Kittanning Area Secondary Schools.

04/15/1964 – Right-handed Dan Leonard of Kittanning High School strode to the pitcher's mound at Lemmon field here yesterday afternoon and (a) tossed a nifty four-hitter; (b) struck out five batters, gave up only one base on balls (c) lost to Elderton 6-4.

04/15/1959 – First ward councilman Charles J. Hoey took over as burgess of Kittanning today following his election last night by Town

Council. Hoey succeeds Harry E. Himes Jr., who resigned March 30 to accept appointment as acting Kittanning postmaster.

04/15/1959 – Kittanning school officials have abandoned the McCain House property, N. McKean Street for classroom uses upon the advice of Commonwealth officials who decided the building unsuitable for classrooms due to lack of sufficient fire protection.

04/15/1959 – Dana Burnett, Armstrong County YMCA general secretary, said that \$51.37 was collected from the bottom of the Y's new swimming pool after it was drained yesterday. The Y's Men's Club had used the pool as a "wishing well" to help finance a hardwood floor for the gymnasium.

04/15/1954 – Miss Betty Lou Adelson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Adelson of 522 N. McKean St., won the "What America Means To Me" essay contest sponsored by Kittanning-Ford City Junior Woman's Club.

04/15/1949 – Kittanning Lions Club members said that more than 3000 eggs will be placed in the riverfront park here for the town's first large-scale Easter egg hunt.

04/15/1949 – A Leechburg miner was crushed to death at the Armstrong Mine of the Leechburg Mining Company in Parks Township. Jesse Logero, 34, of 133 Canal St., Leechburg, was

squeezed between mine machinery and the roof of the mine.

04/15/1944 – The Army is coming to Kittanning next week, it was announced, in search of Armstrong County men and women for civilian jobs at Camp Reynolds, a sprawling Army installation near Greenville.

04/15/1934 – An era in the history of Kittanning was concluded with the passing of one of the community's first citizens, James Denny Daugherty, about 85, in a private hospital in Cleveland. Best known for his invention and subsequent development of the visible typewriter, and for his years of service as a stenographer in Armstrong County courts, the Kittanning resident had been in poor health for several years.

04/15/1929 – Bids for the gates of Lock No. 7 now under construction in the Allegheny River at Kittanning, will be received and opened May 13, by U.S. engineers in charge of the river construction. Bids will be asked for two sets of gates for the lock.

04/15/1929 – Ad in today's paper: Having resigned my position as manager of the meat market in the J. A. Gault Company store, I wish to advise my friends that after completion of new store room in Nulton House, I will open a new meat market of my own. Will publish opening date in very near future. M. R. Bowser.



- With a midnight deadline looming to file state income tax returns, the Department of Revenue is offering advice to last-minute filers. The Department of Revenue says the best option for those who've waited til the last day is to file their state income tax returns electronically. But those who cannot meet tonight's filing deadline can file for an extension. However, an extension to file does not mean an extension to pay any tax that's due and people should pay what they think they owe by tonight's deadline to avoid any interest or penalty.

- More Pennsylvanians are encouraged to become registered organ donors during April which is Donate Life Month. Nearly half of driver's license and ID card holders in Pennsylvania are registered organ donors. But more are encouraged to do so when they renew their driver's licenses. One organ and tissue donor can save as many as 8 lives. Nearly 7,300 state residents are waiting for organ transplants.

- Pennsylvania would have just over a decade to sharply increase its use of renewable energy under legislation introduced in the state Senate. Under the Alternative Energy Portfolio Standard or AEPS, Pennsylvania has until 2021 to generate 8% of its energy from renewable sources. A bill before the Senate increases that to 30% by the year 2030. The current AEPS does not include nuclear energy but it would under separate legislation, aimed at preventing the closure of 2 nuclear power plants
